Jacki: Well, there's... Officially, there's 29 on the list, but probably only about 12 of them I'm working with.

Jeff: Only 12?

Jacki: Only 12.

Jeff: I can barely do English someday.

Jacki: Scots Gaelic is actually my favorite at the moment.

Jeff: Really?

Jacki: Yeah.

Jeff: Why is that?

Jacki: It's fun.

Jeff: Yeah?

Jacki: It's just fun. And I can almost get the pronunciation. Almost.

Jeff: And your last name, Cser, is... Cser is...
