Otis: I love him. He's a good writer.

Jeff: Very good writer. Uh, Pottawattamie Arts, Culture & Entertainment, Hoff Family Center, Ted Wheeler. Ted... Ted Wheeler born in Council Bluffs currently owns Dundee Books with his wife and grew up in Lincoln, but again, from Council Bluffs.

Otis: Great story.

Jeff: Great story. Indeed. And his new novel, the war begins in Paris, uh, a terrific book about two female war correspondents in Paris during World War II. One is, uh, is based on a real life war correspondent. And the other one is a war correspondent from Iowa.

Otis: Oh okay.

Jeff: So, it's sort of this mashup of, of, uh, real and, uh, real life and fiction, historic fiction.

Otis: 1939, Paris, the eve of the war.

Jeff: Absolutely.
