**Otis:** So, you're back, this is 14 years ago today.

**Jeff:** Today, and lands just a few days ago here in Omaha. So, my family and I had been invited to Nebraska's astronaut, Clay Anderson, his launch aboard Space Shuttle Discovery. At the time I was the cartoonist for the World Herald and Clay was taking two of my cartoons on board the shuttle.

**Otis:** Oh, wow, didn't know that.

**Jeff:** It was incredible. I didn't get to go, but my cartoons did. So, as we waited for the launch, I saw this display of famous newspaper front pages from the first moon landing. And there are only just a handful. And one of them was from the World Herald. And the big headline read, "First footprints on an alien world mark a giant leap for mankind, moon is a magnificent desolation". And then Otis, that is when I saw Neil Armstrong, who of course was the first human to step onto the moon.

**Otis:** So, he was right there?

**Jeff:** He was right there. And I went up, I was really nervous, introduced myself and nervously I'm trying to talk to him and I'm pointing to the World Herald front page, trying to explain that that's where I work. But he seemed really tired, so I didn't say a whole lot more.

**Jeff:** Incredible singer and actress. Well, she posted on Facebook that her father had passed away, and I felt terrible, of course, because I hadn't stayed in touch with Bill. So, the memorial service was two Saturdays ago, and it included this beautiful narrative by Jill and her mom with great singing, of course, from Jill and her band, it was incredible. And they were showing, of course, a slideshow with images from Bill's life and his career at the World Herald. And then, Otis, to my surprise, one of the slides was that famous front page with that wonderful headline, "First Footprints on an Alien World Mark a Giant Leap for Mankind. Moon is a Magnificent Desolation". Far from the Kennedy Space Center, I only learned just the other day in Omaha that it was Bill Anderson who had written the very headline I'd pointed out to Neil Armstrong, me showing one hero the work of another unsung hero back in Omaha.

**Otis:** Bill had a great reputation, no doubt about it.

**Jeff:** He absolutely did.

**Otis:** And deservedly so.

**Jeff:** Of course, and Otis, the world has its heroes, but so many more unsung heroes. And so for all of you, if you have a hero in your life, sung or unsung, sing their praises from here to the moon and back.
